
#### Kaiti Neighbourhood Survey


In total there were 51 surveys conducted and collected throughout the Kaiti area. Homes ranged from Belfast Crescent and Crawford Road to Endcliffe Road and Mildura Place. The results from the surveys have been collected, entered and analyzed to show facts, opinions and information about the neighbourhood and what residents want done.

Q1). Gender of Interviewee:



All 51 residents answered this question and 25.5% of them were male and 74.5% were female.

Q2). Relationship Status:



All 51 residents answered this question. The graph shows that over 50% of the people that answered this question are single.

Most of the people within the households interviewed are of Ngati Porou. The percentage of the  $1^{st}$  adult within a household is 63.6%. The  $2^{nd}$  adult had a percentage of 70.0%% and the  $3^{rd}$  adult had a percentage of 66.7%.

There were 20 people in total that were NZ European/Pakeha and 6 people under Other which involved: Pacific Islander, Irish/American Indian and Indian.

Adult 1: The year with the highest completion was 3 years by the 1<sup>st</sup> adult in a household with a number of 19 adults.


Adult 2: The 2<sup>nd</sup> adult in a household had the highest completion of 3 years with a number of 9 adults.

All 51 households surveyed answered this question.


Q5). Level of further training/education completed:




All 51 households surveyed answered this question. Most households have a refrigerator, television and washing machine. Most households did not have a automatic dishwasher or the dial-up internet.

Q8). How many of the following vehicles are owned by people in the household and used on the roads regularly?






Q12). Is the original tenant/owner still living in the house from when it was built?

a). Would you be interested in buying a house in this neighbourhood?




42 out of the 51 households surveyed, answered this question. 55% of them or about 23 households would be interested in buying a house in this neighbourhood.


37 out of the 51 households answered this question and 19 of them do not know a lot about support and finance for first time home buyers.


All 51 households answered this question. 20yrs+ had the highest count for most of the choices except for This House as the highest count for that was 12 under 1-2 years.



All 51 households answered this question. The graph displays where people lived before moving to the Kaiti area or neighbourhood. Most lived in another part of Kaiti which could have been the Waikirikiri area or Inner Kaiti and 37% lived in Gisborne or another part of the Tairawhiti district.

24% or 12 of the households lived else where in New Zealand and 4% lived overseas before moving to the Kaiti neighbourhood.

Q16). How does living in this neighbourhood compare with the previous residence?



This graph portrays how living in the Kaiti neighbourhood compares to the previous residence all 51 households lived in. Most households considered that living in the Kaiti neighbourhood is 'better' compared to their previous residence. But 15 of the 51 households surveyed consider that the neighbourhood is 'not as good'.

Why do you say this?





All 51 households answered this question and the most popular place households buy food at most days is 'London St dairy/fish shop or Pak n Save.'

Most households purchase food from 'Pak n Save' at least once a week, while 16 households shop at the Kaiti mall fish supplies at least once a month.

Most households hardly ever/never shop at the 'De Lautour Rd dairy or the Sail Away fish and chip shop.'



This graphs numbers are based on the number of households that answered each of the services/facilities and whether they are adequate.

Gambling: TAB/pokies/lotto outlets had the highest count for 'Not Important to me' with a count of 31 out of the 51 households that answered.

Community spaces had the highest count of a facility 'Not being OK' with a count of 33 out of the 51 households that answered this question.

Recreational areas had the highest count for 'OK with qualifications' with a count of 8.

Takeaways had the highest count of 'OK' with a count of 43 out of the 51 households that answered this question.


Q21). Overall, do you enjoy living in this neighbourhood?

All 51 households surveyed answered this question and 67% or 34 of them answered 'Yes' meaning that they do enjoy living in the Kaiti neighbourhood.


23% or 12 households answered 'Qualified Yes' meaning that they enjoy the neighbourhood but there could be some possible problems or issues.






Only 40 households answered this question 35% or 14 household's visit others daily, while most visit others on their street once or twice a week.

Q31). Do you know the first names of all your next-door neighbours?



50 out of the 51 households answered this question and 58% said 'yes' they have done something socially with their neighbours. And 36% said 'no' they have not done something socially with their neighbours.


Q33). Would you feel OK asking a neighbour to look after your house while you are away?


Q34). Do you know where most of your neighbours work?

All 51 households surveyed, answered this question.




This graph shows that 22 households do know where their neighbours work but 18 households do not, while 11 only know where some of their neighbours work.

Q35). Have you shared your phone numbers with some of your neighbours?




Q36). How often do you invite your neighbours into your home?



Only 50 households answered this question and the choice percentages were close. The option 'sometimes' had the highest percentage of 38%.




Fifty of the households answered this question and almost 50% of them sometimes help out a neighbour with something. 23 of the households often help their neighbours out with something and 6 almost never do.



Q38). How many Gisborne District Councillors can you name?


The graph shows that Meng Foon has the longest bar showing that he is well known as he is the mayor. There were 3 councillors who were not recognised.





40). Did you vote in the last Government election in 2007? If not, why not?




The graph displays that most of the 50 households that answered this question chose 'yes' they did vote in the last government election. Almost a quarter did not vote and some were not sure or could not remember.



The graph shows that all 51 households answered the question and most of them are registered to vote. Several are not sure and one household is not registered.


Q42). Does the Electoral Commission have your postal details up to date? (Did you get the Referendum voting papers?)

Only 26 households answered this question and they could only name Apirana Mahuika and Selwyn Parata from the Ngati Porou Runanga. One household named a trustee from another Runanga and 20 households could name none.



The graph displays the answers of the 49 households that answered this question. Twenty five of them answered 'no' they did not vote in the last elections, fourteen were not sure and ten answered 'yes' they did.

Q45). If you are eligible, does the Runanga have your postal details up-to-date?

Forty six out of the fifty one households answered this question and 11 households answered 'yes' their postal details are up-to-date while 21 answered 'no' they are not and 14 were 'not sure.'

46 out of the 51 households answered this question.

The GDC and Te Runanga O Turanganui a Kiwa had the lowest rating averages of 2.30 and 2.24 which rounds down to 2 showing that peoples trust and confidence levels are low in services and support they provide.

Local School/s and Ka Pai Kaiti had the highest rating of 3.54 and 3.86 which was rounded up to 4 showing that peoples trust and confidence levels are high in services and support these organisations provide.

- Gisborne District Council has a disability committee of which I was admitted, I have had no contact with this organisation since. – What is the committees function?, How is this committee to service the Ruatoria East Coast peoples?, Why have I not been contacted as I am for and on behalf of the invalid and disabled.
- Maori need to vote if they want to have a say in what goes on. Ngati Porou Hauora/Puhi Kaiti too busy always have to wait for a long time, all booked up.
- More for youth keep them occupied instead of getting drunk/smoking "P" possibly a bowling alley or youth club. Possibly a curfew and drinking age should be put up to 25yrs. Weekend events.
- ➢ Gang issues, safety from them.
- > Gang issues, fast cars, nothing for youth, street on street activities.
- Speeding judder bars, boy racers, more lights, playgrounds, youth facilities.
- Need creative spaces for elderly/Kaumatua at the mall, clean mall up, businesses in mall accountable for quality of service – don't care about people in Kaiti – Pride in Kaiti, kids safety.
- > Churches offer neighbourhood programmes, possibly some parenting programmes and support.
- Use Marae for positive interactions e.g kids activities
- Tidy up streets, tidy state homes and get tenants in them, Police do not come straight away to Kaiti they take their time.
- Rates: what have they done for us in Kaiti? Mental health issues not looked after by hospital. No ongoing care for mentally ill, drug issues.
- > Statistics not showing all issues of Kaiti, the right people being aware of the events in Kaiti.
- More Police patrolling, people walking with alcohol in street. More community awareness breakfast club at Kaiti School, more clubs for kids.
- Disability services info for services, Tertiary services needed in our area, possibly an art display area.
- > Help with violence, young kids all heading for mob life and some parents do not care.
- Housing NZ put families in hoods, neighbourhood feels unsafe because of gangs. Make it safe for kids.

#### Conclusion

There were a total of 51 households surveyed throughout the Kaiti neighbourhood who were to answer 48 questions about their homes, neighbourhood and their area. Not all households answered the questions possibly because they did not apply to them or they did not know the answer.

Women and men answered the surveys and the most common age group was 25 - 39yrs as it had the highest number and gender. New Zealand Maori had the highest count and Ngati Porou was the most common Iwi. There were also Pakeha and other cultures within some of the households.

Three years of high school had the highest count for adults 1 to 4 and the level of further training started or completed was a Certificate.

Households were asked about employment of adults within households. 36 work full-time, 19 work parttime and 23 were unemployed or unable to work. There were a range of jobs people occupied and most were labourers. The jobs are mostly located in the city or out in the country, and most travel by car or van which takes between 5-30min.

Almost all households have a refrigerator, television, washing machine and cell-phone operating at home but most do not have a dishwasher, clothes dryer or the internet. Households have at least one car operating and the most popular form of parking are double concrete strips and on the grass.

30-39% of households are rented privately or through Housing NZ and most homes are stand alone homes with an average of 3 rooms. 40 out of the 51 households are not the original tenants but 23 households would be interested in buying a house in the Kaiti neighbourhood.

20yrs+ in the Gisborne City, Tairawhiti region, Kaiti and this neighbourhood was the highest count for the time lived in these areas. People either lived in another part of Kaiti or Gisborne before moving into their current neighbourhood, and households considered that living in this neighbourhood was better than their previous residence as it was quieter, had less traffic and was easier to get around. There were some households who thought it was not as good as their previous residence because of the gangs, violence and safety of children.

The most common places households purchased food from were the London dairy/fish shop, Pak N Save and shops in the Kaiti mall. Households rarely ever purchased food from the De Lautour Rd shops.

There was a list of services and facilities that households were to choose from and consider if they were adequate in their area and the gambling services were not important. Churches, early childhood services and food outlets were considered OK but the community spaces, tertiary education and recreational areas were not OK.

Streets look clean and tidy most of the time and most households consider their homes and sections to be the right size for them and their families. 63.3% of households do not think it is safe for teenagers and elderly to walk around after dark. Households often visit neighbours once or twice a week and over 80% feel OK asking their neighbours to watch their homes while they are away.

Meng Foon is the most recognised District Council representative as he is the Mayor of Gisborne and Manu Caddie had the highest count for someone to represent Kaiti at Council.

Voting was a subject some of the questions were based on, and most households are registered and did vote in the last government election. Apirana Mahuika and Selwyn Parata were the only Runanga trustees that were named and most households did vote in the last TRONP/TROYAK elections.

There were many suggestions made by households about what they thought were some of the important things Ka Pai Kaiti should be doing for Kaiti. The most common suggestion made was, to organise more events and activities for youth and possibly establishing a centre. Some other points made were if Maori want a say in what goes on they need to vote and to take the TAB away. Ka Pai Kaiti and the local school/s had the highest confidence and trust levels in the service/support they provide.

Overall 61% of households do enjoy living in this neighbourhood and there was a lot of information gathered and analyzed to give answers, opinions and ideas about the possibilities for the Kaiti neighbourhood.
